Language That Became a Top-Secret WWII Weapon

I wouldn't have been able to write this until after 1968 when declassified, 23 years after WWII. But August 14th, Navajo Code Talkers day is important to many here in Arizona, and it's some 56 years later. I feel pretty safe. The story begins in early '40s when WWI veteran Philip Johnston recalled the effectiveness of native American speakers during his stint in the U.S. Army. Johnson was raised by missionary parents on a Navajo reservation and spoke Navajo fluently. He knew of the military's search for a code that was undecipherable by enemy. The unwritten, complex Navajo language spoken only by native Americans of the U.S. Southwest was the answer. This convinced the U.S. Marines who established a whole platoon of Navajo language speakers. According to Chester Nez, one of the original 29 Navajo Code Talkers, as they became known, told that a major took us into a great big room, and said, "You guys are going to have to make

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up a code in your own Native language." That's all he said. He left, closed the door behind him, and locked the door."

Navajo Code Talkers would be part of every Marine assault in the Pacific from 1942 to 1945. The Japanese were totally baffled. It's the only code that has never been deciphered by an enemy. In 1982, August 14th was proclaimed National Navajo Code Talkers Day. Gold congressional medals were awarded in 2001 to the 29 original members for services as radio operators during WWII. And in 2008, Congress passed the Code Talkers Recognition Act, honoring code talkers from all tribes. Only three of the original 29 Navajo Code Talkers are living. Now you know the rest of the story, as late newscaster Paul Harvey might have said.

With great respect and sadness Post 30 acknowledges the death on October 20, 2024 of U.S, Marine John Kinsel, one of the last *Navajo Code Talkers*. He was 107 years old, a resident of Lukachkai, Arizona. He served with the 9th Marine Regiment and the 3rd Marine Division during the Battle of Iwo Jima in WWII.

John Kemp, Legionnaire of the Quarter



John Washington Kemp, Jr., 86, prominent Edgefield resident and 30-year member of American Legion Post 30 is being honored by the post as Legionnaire of the Quarter for Oct.- Dec. 2024. "I joined the Legion because of allegiance to my country" says Kemp.

He's fervently patriotic and quick to tell you about the role South Carolinians played in American Revolutionary victories in high drama battles of King's Mountain in 1780 and Cowpens in 1781. Those battles were parts of a chain of events to eventual Patriot victory over the British at Yorktown, Virginia in 1781, ending the war and paving the way for American independence. "After about 250 years of democracy" says Kemp, "I'm concerned about my country".

John Kemp proudly served in the South Carolina Air National Guard. "I felt I needed to give my country some of my time" he said. He was a Staff Sergeant assigned to the 157th Fighter Squadron at McEntire Air National Guard Base near Hopkins, SC. There, he worked as an airborne radar mechanic on now long retired F-104 fighter aircraft. During the Vietnam War era he was deployed with his unit for nine months to Spain, and he maintains contact with service buddies to this very day.

Locally, Kemp is remembered as a wildlife advocate, award-winning tree farmer, avid poet, entrepreneur of John Kemp Antiques, and former mayor of Edgefield from 1966 to 1968. How fortunate we are to have him in our midst.

From The Halls of Montezuma to The Shores Of Tripoli – Happy Birthday U.S. Marines



The United States Marine Corps (USMC) birthday is celebrated on November 10 in honor of when the Second Continental Congress established the Corps in 1775 to support US naval forces in the Revolutionary War. The day is a significant occasion for active and retired Marines to come together to recognize their history, traditions, and the sacrifices of those who have served. They include Post 30 members, Justin Bailey, Hugh Chrisco, Bruce Everitt, Ronald Peterson, [no relation] and Harry Taylor.

If there was ever a "hybrid" military force, the Marines are it. Their mission is clearly embodied in one of the most readily recognized songs in the world today and the oldest of the service songs of our country, The Marines' Hymn. "From the Halls of Montezuma [the Battle of Chapultepec in 1847, Mexican-American War], To the shores of Tripoli [First Barbary War and the Battle of Derna in 1805 in what is now Libya]; We fight our country's battles In the air, on land, and sea...." Marine protocol calls for Marines present and past to stand at attention, face the music and sing the words to the Hymn. Sir Winston Churchill, British Prime Minister 1940-1945 and 1951-1955, an ardent admirer of the Corps, reportedly could recite all three verses of The Marines' Hymn from memory.

Aside, Tun Tavern in Philadelphia, PA is thought to be where the first Marines enlisted. Others say "no," it was the Nicholas' family tavern, the "Conestoga Wagon." Seek and you shall find! You can ask, but don't think any of our Post veterans enlisted in Philadelphia.

How A Flower Among Rubble of War Became an Enduring Symbol

It was May 3, 1915 near Ypres, Belgium. A Canadian army officer physician Lt. Col. John McCrae was sitting on the rear step of an ambulance staring at the grave of a friend and brother-in-arms killed in action. He saw blood-red flowers growing among the graves and was moved to write the first words of what would become a renowned poem, *In Flanders Fields*. In tribute to McCrae's poem, University pf Georgia professor Moina Michael vowed to always wear a red poppy as a symbol of remembrance of the sacrifices of First World War

soldiers. In 1918, she campaigned to have the poppy adopted as a national symbol of remembrance and was honored by a U.S. three-cent postage stamp bearing her image as the creator of the remembrance poppy.

At the American Legion's 1920 conference in Cleveland, Frenchwoman Anna Guērin addressed Legionnaires about "Inter-Allied Poppy Day." The Legion adopted the poppy as its memorial flower and committed to support Guērin in her U.S. Poppy Day campaign. "The Poppy Lady from France," as she was called, successfully organized the first U.S. nationwide Poppy Day the week before Memorial Day 1921, distributing silk poppies made by the widows and children of devastated France.

In many Commonwealth countries and others, Remembrance Day also known as Poppy Day, is a memorial event usually observed on Armistice Day, the 11th day, of the 11th month and 11th hour (November 11th, our Veterans Day), when the First World War officially ended. In continuing recognition of Poppy Day, American Legion Auxiliaries in the U.S. annually distribute imitation poppies and receive donations in support of veterans, active military personnel and family members in need.

Veterans Experience Action Center (VEAC)

The VEAC will be held from November 14-16, 2024, in Ladson, SC. This event is open to all veterans and their family members and will take place at Exchange Park, located at 9850 Highway 78. The hours for the event are 0900 to 1500 on November 14-15, and 0900 to 1400 on November 16.

This VEAC provides an opportunity for veterans to receive assistance with VA claims and benefits. Attendees can get help with filing VA disability compensation (C&P) claims, pension applications, and even on-site C&P exams for eligible veterans. Additional resources include veteran readiness and employment benefits, access to the VA mobile center, VHA health care benefits with on-site enrollment, and information about VA national cemetery memorial benefits.

Community partners will also be present, offering various services to support our veterans. Past VEAC events have successfully helped thousands of veterans secure the benefits they have earned through their service.
