If your Renewal Notice shows \$55.00, please remember to pay the increased amount of \$60.00.

American Legion members can now take advantage of a three-year membership starting July 1, 2024. This is also called: Multiyear membership.

Multiyear membership sign-up is **ONLY** available on the national American Legion website (<u>legion.org/renew</u> for Current members). Current members **CANNOT** renew for a three-year membership at the local Post level.

Guest Article A Free People, Undivided, Under One Flag

The following essay was provided by Legionnaire Tom Yoder. It was written by his late grandfather Thomas P. Williams, born March 26, 1875, died September 8, 1953, who was a Spanish American War Veteran.

The American flag was born in the cradle of liberty, dyed red in the blood of the Revolutionary War. Made white through the sacrifice of Washington's starving army, its field of blue reflects the noble deeds of its many sons; its stars keep guard over us, its children.

No matter where we may be, we are always in the shadow of the flag.

As we recall the many brave men who have fought to have it, their spirits march past in countless array. We remember the message of Captain Perry on board the Niagara. "We have met the enemy, and they are ours."

We recall the many words of dying Lawrence as he exclaimed, "Don't give up the ship, boys." Who does not know those never-to-be-forgotten words of John Paul Jones, who, when the British officer asked him if he had struck his colors, replied, "I have not begun to fight." Nor do we forget the Intrepid Decatur at Tripoli.

We see those fearless few at the Alamo when Santa Anna with is 4,00 (sic) [c, 1,400] Mexicans attacked them, not one of the 172 Americans were left to tell the story; only the heaps of slain Mexicans told how dearly their victory cost them. The Spartans at Thermopylae had one left to tell the tale; the Alamo had none. So on down through the years, the brace deeds of the men who have fought under the glorious flag are legion. Perry was carried it to the farthest north, where the northern lights keep guard over it as it waves through the long cold night of the artic winter.

East, its starry folds kissed by the warm winds of the south sea, hold safe the route to the Far East.

Westward today, it is being carried to France, where it brings a message to the old world from the new, the message of liberty and truth, telling the free people of Europe that it, too, believes in the things they are fighting for.

So today, Old Glory is fighting side by side with the Tri-Color of France and the Union Jack of England. How it must have thrilled those Americans who had already been fighting under the flags of France and England when they saw the Stars and Stripes go by, knowing at last it had come to fight on the side of justice.

Thousands will lay their lives down in a foreign land that the tradition of the flag may live, but their deaths will not be in vain, for the Stairs and Strips will wave triumphant over the enemy.

And we who are left behind must see that those who are fighting on the field of Europe have the support of a united nation behind them. There is no East, no West, no North, no South. We are all one people under one flag.

We must all hold true to Americanism. We must have not diluted Americanism. We must all be true to the old flag; we dare not divide our allegiance with any other.

And when peace shall come and the battle worn flags return, they will bring to us a feeling that those who have fought and bled and died to save the flag have indeed fought the good fight, have fought for what the flag stands for; liberty, truth, and justice.

So when we bare our heads to the flag, let us not forget that those who have died, died that we may be a free people under one flag.

Generation Z, Where Are You?

The military recruiting outlook is grim. During Department of Defense (DOD) fiscal year 2023 ending last September, the military services collectively missed recruiting goals by about 41,000 recruits. Of the five DOD service branches, only two met active-duty enlisted recruiting goals – the Marine Corps and the

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Space Force – by far the smallest services, squeaked by. The Army, Navy and Air Force all fell short.

Compare this with the period following 9/11 in 2001 when 19 terrorists hijacked four commercial airliners and coordinated al-Qaeda Islamist suicide attacks against the United States killing near 3,000 Americans. More than 250,000 people enlisted in its wake. They joined to defend America and exact justice for the single day in 2001 that was one of our darkest.

While the response to 9/11 by our troops disrupting terrorist networks can't be discounted, the broader picture has again left Afghanistan in the hands of the Taliban, al-Qaeda dominance in Iraq, and a growing Iranian threat in the middle east and Red Sea area. Veterans of these conflicts have suffered immensely and left them and the public disillusioned. Morale is low. Officials say that that only 23 percent of young people between 17 and 24 even qualify to join the military. Even fewer have expressed the propensity to enlist.

Influencing and mentoring Generation Z -- those born between 1996 and 2014, the 14 to 28 year-olds of today -- towards service in the military is crucial. It sounds like a pillar of the American Legion mission statement to "educate, mentor and lead the new generations of Americans" doesn't it? I think so.

There's a New Kid on the Block

On December 20, 2019, the Department of Defense (DOD) gave birth to the United States Space Force (USSF), the first new branch of the armed services in 73 years. With bi-partisan passage of the National Defense Authorization Act, the now almost five-year old joined a family of older military siblings, the Army, Marine Corps, Navy, and Air Force, as the fifth service. It should be notated that the United States Coast Guard remains under DHS, the Department of Homeland Security, as an armed force.

Birth of the Space Force consolidated then existing military space programs under a single command in recognition of a growing threat of space superiority by our adversaries. The USSF would design, acquire, field test, operate, and defend the critical space systems supporting our national interests.

Raising a newborn can be a challenge. There can be some growing pains. As we have soldiers, sailors, airmen, and marines, what would we call members of the USSF? Spacies and Rockettes were out. Wookies, Homo Spaciens, Anti-Gravity Gang, Rocketmen and Floaty Bois also weren't in the running. Guardians of the Galaxy was also a submission in over 400.

Space enthusiasts and military members quickly pointed out that "Guardians" invoked Marvel Comics' "Guardians of the Galaxy" franchise about a motley crew of superheroes in space. Then-Vice President Pence announced just before USSF's first birthday that "Guardians" would be the name.

Belated happy birthday, "Guardians". You just can't please everybody!
