We still have two members who have not paid their 2024 Dues. For the **2024** membership year, our annual Dues are **\$55.00**.

As of July 1, 2024, which is the American Legion 2025 membership year, our annual American Legion Dues will increase to \$60.00. Renewal notices will be mailed out in July, October, January, March, and May.

American Legion members can now take advantage of a three-year membership starting July 1, 2024. This is also called: Multiyear membership.

Here is what you need to know about the Multiyear membership:

- Multiyear membership sign-up
 is ONLY available on the national American
 Legion website (<u>legion.org/renew</u> for Current
 members). Current members CANNOT renew
 for a three-year membership at the local Post
 level or through <u>MyLegion.org</u>.
- Payment for the three-year membership will be upfront.
- There is not a discounted rate with the threeyear membership.
- Membership cards will still be sent annually by Legion posts.
- Those who sign up for a multiyear membership will not receive a renewal notice during the time they have signed up for the multiyear membership.

A single year membership is still an option

Chaplain's Corner "LOVE YOUR ENEMIES"

That is one of the most difficult of Jesus' commandments to me, to be honest. There's a reason why they are my enemies. But Jesus calls for me to pray for them and strive to forgive them. Lord, help me to do this.

When I was deployed to Europe in 2018, I had the privilege of attending an All-Saints Day service in a local cemetery in Swietoszow, Poland. In Poland, November 1 is a national holiday. Families dress up and travel to cemeteries where loved ones are buried. They decorate the graves and head stones with flowers and lit candles, and then sit and pray for them and reflect on the memories. A priest leads a mass in the cemetery and there is a walking procession of singing and prayers.

In this cemetery there was, off to the side, three tombstones and a memorial to the Communist soldiers who had occupied and sometimes violently harassed them and their families for decades. I was surprised they were buried in this local cemetery. Yet, when the mass ended and the prayerful procession began, the first place the crowd went was to the site of the deceased Communists! There they prayed over them. How difficult this must have been to pray for and forgive those who had tormented their families and ancestors since 1945!

I was moved in that moment by these Polish citizens who demonstrated that day what praying for and loving one's enemies is all about. Loving them at least starts by praying for them and forgiving them. The Polish people gave me something to strive for that day. May we all make a fervent effort to pray for and forgive our enemies, if it is Christ we claim to follow. May God help us all.

Guest Article Remembering Post 30 Namesake On Memorial Day

Lest we forget, PVT Hezzie Franklin Griffis, for whom Post 30 is named, succumbed to wounds suffered in France during WWI some 106 years ago. He was a young 22 year-old farm boy from Cleora, Edgefield County when he enlisted in the South Carolina Militia shortly after the U.S. had declared war on the German Empire in April 1917. The militia was subsequently organized into the 118th Infantry Regiment, Hezzie's assigned unit, as part of the 30th "Old Hickory" Division commanded by General John J. "Black Jack" Pershing, to fight in some of the fiercest combat on the Western Front. Hezzie was severely wounded necessitating amputation of his left leg, and died 22 days later on October 30, 1918 at a French hospital. He was exhumed and returned to Edgefield nearly three years later, proudly escorted by members of Post 30 for reburial at Berea Baptist Church.

Edgefield County Honors Fallen Heroes at Annual Memorial Day Ceremony

While Memorial Day weekend unofficially marks the start of summer, a time for backyard barbecues and family gatherings, we must never lose sight of the profound significance behind this day. Memorial Day is, in essence, the most expensive holiday we celebrate as a nation – a day that carries a debt we can never truly repay.

On Monday, May 27, 2024, the Edgefield County community came together to pay their respects and honor the 71 Edgefield County service members who were killed in action and the 8 that were held as a POW during World War I, World War II, Korea, and Vietnam.

American Legion Post 30 Treasurer Doug Timmerman opened the ceremony, followed by Evangelist Henrietta Grimes who delivered the opening prayer. Students from the Fort Eisenhower Youth Challenge Academy posted the colors and were followed by the placing of a wreath at the flagpole by American Legion Department of South Carolina District 17 Commander Jerome Childs and Johnny Abney from the Johnston American Legion Post 222. A beautiful rendition of the National Anthem and recitation of the Pledge of Allegiance was performed by Zariah Brown. Next, guest speaker Chaplain Major William Beaver from Fort Eisenhower and American Legion Post 30 delivered a powerful message. His words reminded us of the enduring courage and selflessness of our fallen brethren, and the profound impact their sacrifices have had on or way of life. Ms. Sara Rainsford recited the poem 'Why Wear a Poppy' and American Legion Post 30 Adjutant Jane Doolittle paid tribute to our POW/MIA service members. American Legion Post 30 legionnaire Paul May read aloud the names of the 71 Edgefield County service members who were killed in action along with the 8 that were held as a POW. Adding to the solemnity of the ceremony, Ms. Carley Baird's rendition of "Taps" on the bugle echoed through the air.

As the ceremony drew to a close, a silence fell over the crowd – a silent tribute to the heroes who gave their all for our freedom. It was a powerful reminder that the cost of freedom can truly never be repaid, and that we must never take for granted the sacrifices made on behalf of our great nation.
